feasibility study! We must accommodate our growing community, address critical infrastructure needs, and restore beauty to our historic campus.

Frankly, that a significant investment is necessary to restore Wisconsin's first academic institution, built before the Civil War, is not surprising. But what is surprising is that this will be the Seminary's first capital campaign in its 179-year history! We have great confidence that with God's grace, and the support of this community, we will be paving the way for the next 50 years of seminary formation in Milwaukee.

However, during this time of exciting changes, what sets the Salesianum apart must remain the same! Our hearts must remain focused, not on the numbers, but on our first and most essential goal. Our mission simply continues, rooted in our formational priority:



Dear Friends,

Saint Francis de Sales Seminary's enrollment would increase in the fall of 2024. We once again ordained 13 priests, which means 26 men in the past two years are now faithfully serving in our parishes. We know that some men each year will make a good discernment and decide to withdraw from formation. And, for much of this year, the number of new men entering was tracking, well... as average. I could not have been more mistaken! As we look to the 2024-2025 formation year, we will form 91 seminarians, with 81 in house – a 10 seminarian increase!

This year's enrollment only reinforces the demand to address significant campus needs in order to safeguard a solid environment where our growing number of seminarians can discern His call and prepare for priestly service. Providentially timed, we are now planning an inaugural capital campaign, after a very successful







year ago, I could not have imagined the fullness of my heart's desire would be gifted to me: pursuing the priesthood in the Catholic Church. After a few days of craziness between meetings, phone calls, and taking a leave of absence from medical school, I heard the words "propaedeutic stage" from my vocation director. Long story short (and through many miraculous doors swung open for me), I walked out of the hospital and into the Seminary for this new mystery year the Church instituted worldwide.

Early on in the orientation process, the words "media fast," "societal ministries," and "community nights" buzzed through the air. Slowly, the fog evaporated, and the true gift of the year became more apparent. I was immersed in prayer, learning, work, and service. A future priest should be a virtuous man who is oriented towards his ultimate goal of being Beatitude in heaven. This is something we call "being integrated." Throughout the year, my class and I consistently heard the axioms "be free" and "be human." The goal was to uplift our humanity through healthy socialization, exercise, rest, and leisure. Simply, to do what humans have always done!

For example, I was able to use my wrestling and weightlifting background to organize workouts for the propaedeutic men. The year provided ample space to pursue exercise, music, and even how to take the perfect nap!

Through societal ministries in the local community, we ministered to the poor and needy with gentle, loving hearts on fire for Jesus. We simply ate, prayed, and chatted with them!

A trip to the Dominican Republic opened our eyes to poverty, the universal Church, and a new cultural experience. We lived with two changes of clothes and relied on God's Providence while living a true spirit of poverty. God taught our minds, hearts, and bellies that living on His Providence truly is freeing!

In bold and subtle ways, God made known His Love for my peers and me in the daily routine of prayer and three silent retreats of the year. The propaedeutic stage provides time and space to break open and deepen the spiritual life.

I marvel at the men God continues to bless me with as we grow deeper in friendship pursuing the priesthood, and ultimately heaven. I think the typical lay Catholic would be surprised how virtuous, relatable, and fun seminarians are! God offered me a great gift in being a seminarian in Saint Francis de Sales' inaugural propaedeutic stage! I am truly filled with gratitude and joy. Praise God for the fruits the propaedeutic stage will reap for His holy Catholic Church!


